So here they are, the books that Unity hopes will get your hearts and minds pumping for the festive season.




My Movie Business - John Irving. pb \$39.95 (Bloomsbury)

Daughter of Fortune — Isabelle Allende pb \$29.95 (Flamingo)



Blue at the Mizzen – Patrick O'Brian hb \$29.95 (Harper Collins)






Blood Rain - Michael Dibdin. pb \$29.95 (Faber)

At the centre of this book is the brilliant but enigmatic and controversial painter described by Colin McCahon as 'the best of the very best'. Contributors range from Thucydides to Andy McNab, and are as diverse as a French Knight's experience at Agincourt to the bombing of Nagasaki.




The First World War - John Keegan pb \$40.00 (Pimlico)

Highly readable and widely acclaimed chronicle about the defining battle of World War II. One of our best selling history books this year. A good quality paperback for all history buffs.




1066: The Year of the Three Battles – Frank McLynn pb \$40.00 (Pimlico)





Marshall and Zoahr. pb \$35.95 (Quill)

Tennis and the Meaning of Life


Jay Jennings (Ed.) pb \$37.95 (Harcourt Brace)



Mad about Madeline: The Complete Tales




Ludwig Bemelmans hb \$79.95 (Viking)


Tulipomania - Mike Dash. hb \$39.95 Special Price (Gollancz)

A vivid and surprising account of life in England 1000 years ago. Give it to the social historian in your life this New Year's Eve.






